local corn, bell peppers, squash, and cucumbers, while East


Coast berries and stone fruit are wrapping up for the season.


In contrast, fall favorites like sweet potatoes and pumpkins are

tightening in the East, especially on yellow varieties, while Western regions are experiencing more stable volumes. Quality is holding strong across all regions. **CAULIFLOWER** Quality and supply are on the rise, signaling improvement in the cauliflower market. While the market remains triggered, it's no longer at extreme levels. Some growers are sticking to their averages, but overall supplies are becoming more available.

The supply in Eastern regions has been

inconsistent due to transitional gaps and

insect pressure affecting quality. Western

growers have also seen lighter supplies

and quality issues this week, keeping the



Extreme heat over the past few weeks has severely limited green onion supplies, with prices remaining elevated. Growers are holding to averages, and supplies continue to be very tight. **ORANGES** The orange market is seeing increased activity, with prices climbing as growers struggle with quality losses both in the field

and during packing. The season is likely to

end sooner than anticipated. However, Chilean navels are arriving in good volume with much better quality.

PINEAPPLES Pineapple supplies remain tight on large sizes (5/6ct), with 5ct particularly limited. This situation is expected to continue until mid-month.
